



# THE 20 COMMANDMENTS

THESE are the secret instructions issued by the Department of Health and Social Security to all their clerks. Claimants should insist that they keep to these rules. If they don't, complain to the office manager or phone the regional office (922 7101) and ask for Mr Riste, Mr Stanton or Mr Jones - in that order. Let the Free Press know what happens.

### THE RULES

1. Keep the reception desk manned. Don't leave it without asking someone to take your place. 2. Don't give cause for public criticism

of time wasting. 3. Remember the office is on show, Keep

t looking tidy and efficient. 4. Put the caller first. You may have other work to do also, but while at the reception desk or public counter your first job is the caller who is not to be treated as an unwelcome interruption in the day's work.

5. Give the caller your whole attention. Let him feel he has your alert and

friendly interest.

6. Meet rudeness with firm politeness, not retaliation or servility. 7. Try to see yourself in the other person's place. Apparent truculence or slowness may be caused by nervousness or embarrassment. Remember too that to each one

of these people his own case is the most important in the world. 8. Let the caller state his case. Don't cut him short because you think you know what he is trying to say. Speed in dealing

with people is of no value unless they feel they've had a hearing. Help him to define his problem. He may find it difficult to express himself or be too shy to ask directly for what he wants. 9. Don't humiliate the enquirer who makes mistakes in our technical terms

or procedure. 10. Speak to the public in language they can understand, not technical phrases or official jargon. Legal phrases may sometimes be necessary in official forms, but need translating for the average en-

11. Help the caller to understand our official procedure and reasons behind our 'red tape' regulations.

12. Tell the caller what happens next. If you are going to look for his papers tell him, so he waits, If there is nothing further for him to do until he hears from us tell him.

13. Show interest but avoid forced heartiness. Indifference can be even more irritating than actual rudeness, but remember insincerity is quickly detected by the

public. 14. Don't criticise another department in public hearing.

15. Confirm that the enquirer has understood. However brief your follow-up must be, make sure that the caller has received an answer to his problem, as far as it can be given, and has understood

16. Don't lose all interest in a caller if you find he has come to the wrong office.

Direct him to the right place, or, if it

will save him a journey, telephone the other office for the information he wants. 17. Make sure any explanatory leaflets you issue are up to date. 18. If you have to refuse a request, express regret and tell the caller why. 19. Cultivate a professional manner. 20. See ourselves as others see us. Sometimes we are the caller in offices or shops. This is our opportunity to understand how the other person feels and to
