BEER

BEER is one of the few consumable products which the customer has to take on trust, since at present there is no legislation to compel accurate

listing of ingredients and strength. CAMRA maintains that the beer drinker is entitled to this information as many of the beers he drinks have considerably changed in strength and composition and very rarely for the better. It's high time the brewers were brought into line with the rest of the food and drink trade.

Malted barley, hops, yeast and water are the only substances which should be found in a brewery, but it is now more widely known that many "raw grains" infiltrate our national drink.

These are defined in the EEC Draft Directive on Beer (1970) as "unmalted barley and wheat, maize grits, broken rice, and starch obtained from maize, non-durum wheat and rice". We also know that many brewers are using hop extracts and powders as well as, or in place of raw hops.

CAMRA, in its recent submission to the Food Standards Committee, recognised that these substances are probably inevitable in order to contain costs, but that their total should not exceed 30% of the total grist and that the exact percentage should be declared, and made available on request along with full lists of ingredients in every retail outlet.

Clearly stated at the actual point of dispense should be the original gravity and the alcoholic content by volume of the beer. To the lay customer this is one quickly recognisable method of determining the value for money and strength of what he is drinking.

Any reduction in gravity saves the brewer material costs and excise duty and so long as these figures remain undeclared, lay the brewing companies open to charges hopeful of the outcome. Perhaps, iation discovered that one brand of

beer dropped in gravity from 1043° in 1960 to 1036° in 1972 whilst continuing to be marketed under the same name.

Back in 1972 the 'People' newspaper discovered that one of our large brewers offered the same liquid under different names (and sometimes at different prices!). In such ways, and encouraged by advertising campaigns stressing strength and virility, the public can be conned into thinking their beer is an unchangingly worthwhile product.
