Battle looms over bus cuts

LIVERPOOL BUSMEN are preparing to resist further cuts in services planned by the MPTE.

150 buses off the road in addition to the 60 axed (with difficulty) earlier this year.

The MPTE have already given details of the new cuts. But so far no date has been fixed for bringing them in.

As soon as a date is announced. the busmen's Joint Shop Stewards Committee will implement a policy of 'no co-operation'. This means, according to one steward, that "There'll be a big slow-down."

Buses will not leave stops until all passengers are seated; doors will not be opened until the bus has stopped; speed limits will be strictly observed; and defective buses will not leave the garage.

Shop stewards are aware of the Management want to take another difficulties in carrying this out, and also that passengers will suffer shortterm inconvenience.

And some are angry that a national directive from the Transport Workers' union has given management a way to justify service cuts. It said no cuts should be allowed for financial reasons - unless there was a reduction in passenger demand.

Management, of course, can both manipulate passenger figures and actually reduce demand by, for instance, raising fares or withdrawing free travel passes.

The MPTE's latest plans include ending a number of services altogether. These are the 16, 35/36, 50, 52, 19e, 12a, 71, 87, and Rapidride services 439, 400 and 438.

The Area Health Authority considered Vauxhall to be top priority for a health centre but couldn't go ahead with its plans because the GPs refused to co-operate. The doctors said they were too old to change and their patients wouldn't like the site. The Area Health Authority was considering building elsewhere.

Now the doctors say they are interested in the centre and the Health Authority can press ahead with its plans to build in Vescock Street, on the open land between the Lee Jones Centre and the Rising

The consent of the doctors clearly shows how well-organised pressure can have some effect on the Health Service. Working together, the Vauxhall Neighbourhood Council and Central/South Community Health Council were informed and persist-

They were determined that people in Vauxhall should not continue to put up with "slum surgeries" or the poor facilities at the school and fam-

ily health clinics run by the Area Health Authority.

The new health centre should be open in August 1979 and will include five GPs' consulting rooms, school and family health clinic services, physiotherapy, occupational therapy, chiropody and dental services.

Whether the GPs in Boundary Street and Scotland Road, who are now willing to work from the centre will actually practise there is in doubt.

Most are nearly seventy years old and may have retired or died by the time the centre opens. This will be the time for younger doctors with a fresh approach to community health care to move into the area... doctors who know that their patients will benefit if they work as part of a team with health visitors, secretaries, district and school nurses and social workers.



It is run by the people behind Wehrli Ltd, who are well known to brokers. At least one large insurance company refuses to deal with them because of their methods.


