JAZZ

SADLY, the Banyan Tree has now closed. Its transformation into a casino, which has been projected for a long time, is now under way and its nights of jazz are over. Although most forms of jazz have been presented there (I remember particularly a fine evening with Wild Bill Davison and the Merseysippi Jazz Band), it is the modern fans who will miss the Banyan most, as many top musicians have appeared there in the last four years. Despite the plastic glasses and the ale - the price and quality of which would have CAMRA members weeping into their T-shirts - it will be missed, and we hope the organisers will find alternative premises soon.

Happier news from Southport, in that the Arts Association there are planning concerts in the autumn featuring guitarist Barney Kessel, the Graham Collier Big Band, the John Taylor Octet and the John Warren Band. Details of these from the Merseyside Arts Association (709) 0671) or Alan Daiches of the Southport Arts group.

In Hoylake (where, incidentally the local Arts Association is a most thriving concern which regularly features jazz in its programme) Finnegan's Steak Bar in Albert Road now has jazz on Monday nights. Also on the Wirral, the Savoy Jazzmen have started Tuesday night sessions at the Parkgate Hotel, Parkgate.

Regulars at the Coffee House, and many other venues on Merseyside, will be sad to hear of the departure this month of Blue Magnolia banjo/guitar man Phil Probert. He is moving to London and his exciting solos will be sorely missed, as will his ensemble playing. Too often the mindless jazz critics have underrated the role of the banjo as an ensemble instrument (an unhappy memory of the 'Trad boom' days?) and it is to be hoped that Phil Probert's departure will not mark the end of his style of playing on the local scene.

FOLK

"SILLY SISTERS" - Maddy Prior and June Tabor. (Chrysalis, 1976)

VOCALLY, "Silly Sisters" lacks depth in terms of tone and musically it lacks the unexpected that makes a record exciting. The result is fairly shallow artistry, smooth in texture but brittle and frail in durability. Of the thirteen songs (twelve traditional one contemporary) only six escape some form of criticism, either on the grounds of treatment or suitability, after discussion with various people both at home and at the Folk Song Workshop.

Nevertheless it is refreshing to have an album devoted to two female vocalists of some repute. Not since 'The Female Frolic" (Argo, 1968) have we had anything similar, but in that instance the record was devoted to essentially feminine songs, giving an essentially feminine outlook on to their world.

"Silly Sisters" is not so hard-line in attitude; neither does it possess the same political undertones that we have come to expect from the Critics Group. The album is obviously intended for a different audience - a more general appeal embracing the whole folk spectrum. It includes Four Loom Weaver - about a man on strike circa 1820 - The Grey Funnel Line written by Cyril Tawney about a guy fed up with the Royal Navy - and Singing the Travels which is really a dialogue between a serving man and a husbandman extolling the virtues of the latter's life style. All are well sung but how suitable are they to two girls singing in harmony? You can guess at my answer, but it is nice to see the potential of Grey Funnel Line realised.

Maddy's solo, Lass of Loch Royal is a fine interpretation of an Irish ballad - a perfect example of her polished professional singing with Gabriel McKeon providing tasteful and moody accompaniment on uilleann pipes. Also, it's a fine tune! June's solo, Geordie, is a version I have not heard before. More than competently dealt with by June Tabor, it has the added attraction of Martin Carthy, musically philanderous as ever, providing guitar backing. Only praise.


But the combined efforts of the 'Sisters" is varied. "Simply nice" would be a nice way of summing most of it up. Witness The Seven Joys of Mary, a pre-Reformation carol, although it is greatly relieved by the multi-musicianship of John Gillaspie with bassoons, sopranino and bombard - he's a little medieval band all on his own! It is tempting to conclude that Dame Durden is fine to dance to but not very interesting to listen to. Similarly, The Game of Cards lacks subtlety and guts. Compare the song with Sam Larner's rendition (Folkways, 1961) called All Fours - at least you know he's singing about a sexual encounter and lets you know he's enjoying it.

The highlights for me are The Seven Wonders, My Husband's Got No Courage in Him (listen to Maddy Prior's fifth verse), and Burning of Auchidoon which I would love to hear Dick Gaughan sing - he knows how to put his rrr's into his 'burns'. Silver Whistle is very enjoyable but the "ingenious tune" by John Moynihan at the end is boring and repet-
