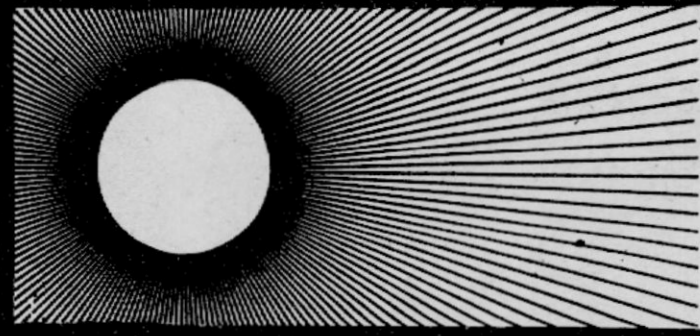

## HOW H.E.L.P. CAN HELP

Many people today are faced  
with social and financial prob-  
lems. The Welfare State was cre-  
ated as a RIGHT to help people  
overcome these difficulties. But  
many still do not know about  
these services, or are reluctant  
to use them, even though they  
are entitled to.

One service has been set up  
simply to help people who are  
out of work and old age pension-  
ers (and sometimes others as  
well) to deal with their financial  
problems by providing them with  
a little extra money. It is run by  
the Department of Health and  
Social Security. In certain cases  
they will help people to pay for  
their rent, clothing, bedding,  
removal expenses, redecorating,  
bus or train fares, special diets,  
special heating needs, costs  
involved in a new job etc.

But many pensioners or un-  
employed people do not know  
about this.

You can find out about this

service at your local post office  
or social security office, but  
there is now a group of people  
called H.E.L.P. who specialise  
in advising people about their  
rights.

These people are willing to  
explain how the service works  
and if you wish, will put your  
case for you to the social  
security. Even if you have tried  
to get your benefit in the past  
and have not done so, they  
can still help.

You can contact these people  
during the day or night. The  
first two are best during the day.
